



Onyinye Iwu

Last autumn our P7 children had been inspired by illustrator Onyinye Iwu's *Queens of Africa* series to create their own artwork. It was therefore an absolute joy to be able to bring the children


together with Onyinye herself in this very special BookFest event!

Onyinye's vibrant illustrations can be found in countless books including My Skin, Your Skin, the Too Small Tola series, Happy Here, Hey You! and Goodnight Stories for Rebel Girls: 100 Real-Life Tales of Black Girl Magic.




Onyinye began by talking the

up in Italy to coming to the UK and studying. She showed the children some of the drawings she had done at college when she wasn't much older than they are now.

The *Queens of Africa* series was inspirational for the children last year, so Onyinye showed them how she had created the artwork, from pencil sketches to drawing the background patterns. She explained that she had wanted to celebrate people who haven't been celebrated before.







It was amazing for the children to see how Onyinye had designed and created them, and to hear her talk about her creative process. She gave P7s behind-the-scenes insight into how to work with pattern, from selecting a motif to applying it to their own work.





Onyinye led a draw-along with the children, asking them to choose someone important to them to illustrate, whether a family member, friend, famous figure that they connect with or someone else of significance to them.


She worked alongside the children as they drew the figures, then encouraged them to create a relevant background pattern. Our artwork was wonderful!

Onyinye's latest book is *We Sang Across the Sea: The Empire Windrush And Me* for which she worked with author Benjamin Zephaniah. Onyinye shared how she worked on the illustrations, showing us step-by-step behind the scenes detail of the computer package she uses to layer up the artwork, add colour and create the finished images. It was a fascinating insight into the work of a professional illustrator.

Finally, the children were able to ask Onyinye their questions in a friendly Q&A

packed with advice, interest and insight. Questions included what she does if she ever finds herself lacking inspiration, how long it takes her to create an illustration, whether she feels she has made a change in the world, which artists inspire her and whether she comes from an artistic family.

Stockbridge Primary School's annual BookFest is packed with diverse and innovative ways to celebrate reading – whatever the circumstances!



After two years of the covid pandemic, and against a distressing global backdrop, BookFest brought brightness in dark times. It added excitement and sparkle, lifted spirits and celebrated our international community. BookFest encouraged children to share experiences, to learn and understand more about other countries and other children's heritage, and to revel in our school's diversity as a source of strength. We aimed once again to bring some literary magic to children living through unprecedented times.

BookFest 2022 was a hybrid festival, but we seized the chance to turn the limitations of pandemic restrictions into opportunities. BookFest reached out to authors and illustrators across the UK, with virtual events enabling connections we could never hope to make in person. And just as this year's BookFest drew to a close came a glimmer of hope for the future, as we were able to invite our first illustrators and authors to the school in person.





This year's BookFest was underpinned by our longstanding aim of ensuring that every child can see themselves in a book. We drew upon the school's theme for the year of Diversity and Inclusion, with events championing neurodiversity and dyslexia, celebrations of our multitude of languages, and, as always, a focus not just on the written word but on telling stories through images. We're committed to making sure that not only can every child recognise themselves in book characters and in book illustrations, but that they also see themselves in the authors and illustrators we bring to BookFest.
