## **Neill Cameron**

Robots! Jetpacks! Inspiration! Awesomeness! Bookfest could not believe our luck in being able to welcome the hugely popular comics writer and illustrator Neill Cameron to Stockbridge Primary School. Neill travelled all the way from Oxford to lead two brilliantly funny, hands-on comic workshops with our Primary 4 to Primary 7 children.

Neill is an absolute favourite of many Stockbridge children thanks to his work in *The Phoenix* weekly comic. He's the creator of the super-exciting *Mega Robo Bros* graphic novel series, the *Awesome Robot Chronicles* books and many more.

This was a chance for Stockbridge children to meet, draw with, learn from and be inspired by one of the top comics creators in the UK – and they really made the most of it!

Neill's advice was to base ideas in real life – even if a story is set in the future, or in space, or is jampacked with aliens and explosions, it will feel relatable if it's based on something real and true.

Neill explained that one of the many brilliant things about making comics is that you don't need a degree, fancy equipment or a multimillion pound budget. You can just do it, as long as you have a pencil, some paper and a brain full of ideas. Luckily Stockbridge children are bursting with creativity!

Neill explained that when you're writing a weekly comic you need to come up with ideas all the time. He shared his amazing comic formula: take a thing that is awesome, and 'smoosh' it together with another thing that is awesome, and you will end up with something that is totally SUPER AWESOME!

"It even had maths in! We had to add one awesome thing to another awesome thing to make something super awesome!"

Neill showed us his drawings of dinosaurs with jetpacks, and pointed out that not only was this now super awesome but there was now a character. How did the dinosaur get the jetpack? The children had tons of ideas! What about this pirate monkey? There was a sea of hands up as children shared their brilliantly creative theories of how the monkey became a pirate, or a pirate became a monkey...

The children then brainstormed all the things that they count as Awesome.

Neill shared some drawing tips about how to convey character in just a few details – for an example an eye patch and a cutlass are all it takes to create a pirate, or wings and a wand to make a fairy.

He drew a hot dog boxer!!"

After whittling down these amazing ideas to a shortlist including evil gerbils, toaster cars and donuts fighting evil chickens, the children picked their favourites. Neill drew the winning ideas with lots of input and creative ideas from the children. Meet Bob, the Marshmallow Spy and Frank, the Hot Dog Boxer!

Then Neill suggested that children pick two things from the list, or from their own ideas, and have a go at drawing a comic character of their own.


"I had lots of fun drawing a pizza that shot hot cheese from a pistol with Neill." P4


Everyone got straight down to drawing – sharing their ideas, chatting about their characters and comparing notes on back stories.

Finally Neill answered children's questions in a Q&A and signed huge stacks of books. And each child got some Mega Robo Bros stickers as a souvenir of a wonderful morning.
